# Some Qualities that make a great Dialysis Nurse:

- Able to keep confidentiality at all times- All information regarding the patient must be kept confidential and personal.
- Compassion- It is important to be able to give comfort and be empathetic to the patients, we may not know what they are experiencing but we should be able to accommodate and support them.
- Sense of deeper understanding to life-We have seen some of the worst parts of life and we understand and appreciate the important aspects of life.
- Professionalism-We should deal with the patients professionally and we should apply ethical practice always.
- Flexibility Nurses should be flexible, enthusiastic and energetic towards each other and with the patients.
- Sense of Humor- It is important because it keeps us going through tough times.

It is also very important that we pay attention into giving information to patients and their family regarding their condition. To achieve this, communication skills are very important. It is also essential to have good work ethics, have a positive outlook and focus on the patient's needs.

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Learning and working at the Dialysis Department



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This brochure was created to give persons who are interested in learning about and working at the dialysis department information about the theoretical and practical part of the dialysis nurse course and tasks.

The Dialysis Department is situated west of the Emergency Room. We are open from Monday to Saturday 7am to 8pm. There are about 36 dialysis patients (2013). At this time we do not have any Peritoneal Dialysis (PD) patients. PD patients basically perform their procedure at home and come to the dialysis for checkups.

# Layout of the department

- 1 Treatment Room, with 9 dialysis stations
- In the middle of the treatment room, there is a nurse's observation station
- 1 isolation room
- 1 Reverse Osmosis (RO) room with 1 RO system
- 1 storage room
- A nurses' station with 2 computers, telephone and a copy machine
- 1 kitchen/coffee room for use exclusively by personnel

### What is Hemodialysis? How does it work?

**Hemodialysis** is a treatment that is done with the help of artificial kidney or a process that uses a man-made membrane (dialyzer).

Consider a container divided by a vertical cellophane partition. One side of the cellophanepartitioned tank will be filled with blood. The other, with a solution of certain minerals and water (the dialysate bath). The partition forms what is known as a semipermeable membrane. So some substances will pass through it, but others will not.

Normal blood is 90% water. Molecules of water in our two compartment tanks will pass freely back and forth through the cellophane membrane between the blood and the bath. However, blood also contains red and white cells, protein, fat, sugar, minerals (called electrolytes) and waste products.

The red and white cells are much too large to pass through the cellophane, so they will stay in the blood compartment. The same is true of the fat and protein molecules. However, electrolytes, because of their small molecular size, pass freely (or "dialyze") through the cellophane membrane in both directions.



# What does the dialysis machine do?

The dialysis machine mixes and monitors the dialysate. Dialysate is the fluid that helps remove the unwanted waste products from your blood. It also helps get your electrolytes and minerals to their proper levels in your body. The machine also monitors the flow of blood while it is outside of the body.

# Working as a Dialysis Nurse

The goal is that through the schooling, students can learn how to execute a dialysis treatment independently. The trained dialysis nurse:

- Prepares the dialysis machine
- Cannulate, connect and terminate the patient from the machine
- Guide patient and family concerning hemodialysis
- Execute care plan around the patient
- Handles patients during calamities

**Hemodialysis** is a serious responsibility, but patients don't have to shoulder it alone. It requires a coordinated effort from the whole health care team. The most important members of the health care team are the patients and their family. By learning about the treatment, they can work with the health care team to give them the best possible results, and they can lead a full, active life.

Accept and processing the he or she is dependent on the machine can be upsetting to patients and can lower their self-esteem and independence. Some patients pass through a mourning process or a difficult time. The nurse is there for the patients, to guide and motivate them through the whole process.
